Comment on peanut allergy addendum

April 16 is the deadline to comment on the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases' 2016 Addendum to the 2010 *Guidelines for the Diagnosis and Management of Food Allergy in the United States*. The addendum includes three recommendations to prevent peanut allergy in infants.

According to the 2015 Learning Early About Peanut Allergy trial, allergy-prone infants had reduced development of allergy with early introduction of peanut-containing foods. The addendum includes suggestions for early peanut introduction to infants prone to eczema and egg allergy, including the age of introduction. It also discusses the timing of introduction of other solid foods. For infants without eczema or any food allergy, it suggests age-appropriate free introduction of peanut-containing foods together with other solid foods, and "in accordance with family preferences and cultural practices."

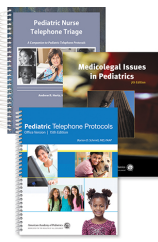
Online motor delay tool

Physical Developmental Delays: What to Look For is an interactive tool available at <http://motordelay.aap.org/> for parents of children ages 5 and under to use when they are concerned about their child's motor development.

The tool lists physical activities by the age at which they are typically performed. If parents are concerned that their child has not achieved a certain milestone or if there have been setbacks, they can click on boxes next to activity descriptions. This creates a list — with space for notes — that can be taken to the next pediatrician appointment.

Pediatricians seeking answers to parents' questions can reference the AAP clinical report *Motor Delays: Early Identification and Evaluation*, <http://bit.ly/1TeldUh>. The report includes an algorithm to guide developmental surveillance and screening, red flags signaling a need for prompt referral and recommendations on appropriate testing.
